


#### A VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITY WITH THE PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL

This is both in London and some other towns in the UK. There is a fully equipped veterinary bus to provide any treatment that may be required. The charity acknowledges the great benefit of having a pet for many homeless people which assists their often fragile mental health and an important extension of their work is to try to find permanent accommodation for these individuals. There are trained vets and veterinary nurses who work for the charity on a voluntary basis.

A TMBC Representative attended our 25th March monthly meeting to advise on the new waste and recycling contract.

We have some available allotments. Contact Dave Young 01634 867669. Please ensure that you "park pretty" in all areas of the village, avoiding dropped kerbs/junctions, on pavements, obscuring sight lines and of course double yellow lines to name just a few. Parking, as in all small villages like Burham, can become a problem, so we all need to be aware of others. The Village Hall overflow car park has recently been resurface and is now a quality area to park and in walking distance to most areas of the village.

The Church Street One Way Survey: Due to the survey results and the lack of responses afterwards, no further action will currently be made by the Parish Council in relation to a one way system.

Spring village litter pick: This took place on 23 March 2019 10am. The lease for the land between Court Rd and New Court Rd will be signed very soon (if not already signed). Contractors for grass cutting and hedge trimming have been contacted already.

There is only a few days left to submit any nominations for the local elections The deadline for submission is 4pm on Wednesday 3<sup>rd</sup> April. This is a strict deadline.

We have requested that the wooden planters on Whitehouse Crescent green are removed as they are rotten in places. We will be having ground level planting in the same areas.

We are still collating information on the 155 Arriva Bus Service, so if you have experienced any problems, lateness, no arrival or other matters relating to the service please let me know asap after the event.

At the recycling site, there is now a bank to enable you to recycle clothes and textiles. Residents may still not be aware of it. Please place items in a bag before putting into the bank. The bank generates funds which are paid directly to us. So with Spring around the corner, perhaps it is time for a spring clean of your clothes and textiles? *continued* ...... continued ......

#### April in your Garden

'And Spring arose on the garden fair, Like the Spirit of Love felt everywhere, Each flower and herb on Earths dark breast, rose from the dreams of its wintry rest.'

With Easter falling in April this year, it brings with it the prospect of the lighter evenings over the long weekend to hopefully give ample opportunity to enjoy your garden. The clocks have now sprung forward, and we have the warm weather to look forward to, together with the lengthening evenings all being ideal for getting out into the garden or enjoying an evening stroll in the fresh air, which is a good opportunity to see what's new in your local area and seek inspiration from other gardens for plants that you like and may do well in your own garden. Our soil here is generally chalky loam, which actually provides a good soil structure for most plants.

By now the Daffodils, Snowdrops and early Tulips have gone over, so nip off any flower heads to ensure the plant puts its energy back into the bulb for next year. Spring bulbs can also be lifted and divided now if they are creating a large clump. Simply dig the whole clump up and gently break up into smaller clumps for replanting into other areas, sprinkle with a little slow-release fertiliser such as blood, fish & bone to feed the bulbs ready for next year. Primulas and Pansies should continue to look good for another month so keep deadheading to promote fresh flowers.

In the vegetable garden, by mid-April the soil should be warm enough to successfully sow most seeds direct. Carrots, Beetroot, Parsnips, Peas and Turnips are amongst many of the seeds that can all be sown direct now, and can also be sown successionally to ensure the maximum harvest. Sowing small amounts of seeds a few weeks apart will mean there is less chance of a glut and you can enjoy harvesting a range of vegetables whilst at their best. By now Broad Beans should be growing strongly and would also benefit from a light feed and also having their tips pinched out to help prevent pest attack. Other things to be doing in the garden now:

- Spring flowering plants such as Forsythia, Clematis Montana and Ceanothus should be pruned once flowering has finished. Camelia and Magnolia however should only be lightly pruned to maintain their shape and size.
- Feed and mulch the garden to ensure plants have a fresh nutrient supply, and to also help lock moisture into the soil for later in the year. Use compost or bark to improve longer term soil structure.
- Regular mowing of the lawn and neatened edges (use a half-moon edging blade) will keep it looking tidy for the season.

#### Great Crested Newts wander free as wildlife and homeowners happily 'co-exist' at Peters Village

Environmental studies at Peters Village in Kent show that people and wildlife are flourishing side by side.

The new 1,000-home community near Wouldham offers a green and diverse environment for residents. It holds extensive views of the River Medway and adjoining reed beds, scrubland, wooded hills and chalky habitats in the historic Peters Pit Quarry nature reserve; a permanent landmark and reminder of local history and heritage.

These rich natural resources have benefited from sympathetic habitat creation and enhancement by Peters Village developer Trenport, over the past decade or so – now highlighted by a three-year environmental study.

Most notably, it shows wildlife using purpose-built passages beneath roads and trackways to move between the substantial retained areas of green space, when they might otherwise be at risk from vehicle traffic.

In particular, Great Crested Newts – a protected species – are using these tunnels exactly as hoped and planned: to explore between the designated Peters Pit SSSI (Site of Special Scientific Interest) and land beside the River Medway. This allows this rare species to avoid what are known as fragmentation effects, when countryside is divided by roads, housing and industry.

Ecologist Tom Langton has enjoyed an overview of the project for Trenport and its predecessors for over 30 years, through surveys and designing habitat measures and is delighted by the studies progress:

"It's rewarding news for all those who have worked so hard to make the project work. The Government's Natural England agency licenced the project and the charity Froglife assisted with special technology to count amphibians, small mammals and other animals moving through the passages. Both are thanked for

their support and close involvement. "This is now the third year of a five-year study of passage use and Trenport's wildlife ranger Terry Venn has played a major role in driving the project towards its final goals.

"The four passages, the largest of which is around 20 metres long, have roof slots to let rain in and allow air circulation. They are joined to special low fences that prevent animals from getting onto the road and being hit, while enabling them to move safely to the other side.

The measures together show how large-scale mitigation and licencing for house building can be a success by designing a future for them within the places where we live, without physically re-locating animals to new areas, with often dubious net gain.

"And they show that if wildlife population survival is properly planned, people moving onto a new development can enjoy the

area's wild animals and plants close-up as much as other recreational space options.

"They also have enviable opportunities to participate in the real wealth of surrounding wildlife in this part of Kent. Charities such as the Kent Wildlife Trust (KWT) and schools are close by too, offering further advice and opportunities for all generations to join in."

Trenport Director Chris Hall said: "We are pleased that our partnership with KWT, which carries out much of the day to day wildlife conservation, has resulted in hundreds of newts being recorded within our network of wetlands across Peters Village – our Great Crested Newt population is one of the top sites in England.

"This results from a long-term investment over four decades, with the aim of integrating new homes with the natural environment – nearly 170 of the projected 1,000 homes are now occupied at Peters Village.

"It follows intricate decision making and considerable financial investment, so it is pleasing to read this report and find many species using the corridors, plus new ponds, grassland, hedges and other features preserved and formed as a coherent open spaces provision.

"Looking ahead so that, for example, trees and hedges are fully formed before the first keys to new homes are handed over is what 'planning for the future' is all about and we are delighted by the numbers and movements of the newts, plus success in conserving other important species such as dormice, bats and birds.

"We hope the next ten years will consolidate this work and complete the experts' studies. As onsite building disturbance settles, a vibrant and attractive area will show how house building and the environment can move forward hand in hand.

"We would like to thank the dozens of people who, over the years, have contributed to getting us to this exciting moment."
