WOULDHAM PARISH COUNCIL - AUG/SEPT

Our last meeting was on the 4th July, 2023. Reports etc will be published on our website. There is NO meeting in August, so the next meeting will be on Tuesday the 5th September, 2023 in the Village Hall,

commencing at 7:30pm.

Agenda and details can be found on the website 4 days before the meeting.

Wouldham Village Hall

Unfortunately, after many years of providing a service to Wouldham, Jellybeans Pre-school have decided to close. However, the Parish Council and Village Hall Charity are looking to encourage new groups to fill the gap and there is a new baby yoga and massage starting in October/November and a Parent and Toddlers group being arranged by mums. There will also be another Health Check session on 4th August, during the Friday Coffee Morning.

Peters Village

The Parish Council formally asked Borough Councillors to facilitate a site meeting with Trenport on 15th June and were asked to provide questions prior to a meeting. The email sent is as follows:

1. The Parish Council has agreed to purchase Salt Bins and it has been agreed by TMBC that they will fill them and keep them topped up. All we require is permission and location for these Salt Bins.

2. We would like to provide a notice board outside the Co-op. We have spoken to the Manager, who is agreeable. However, again this needs permission.

3. The Parish Council supplied public benches for Peters Pit which were vandalised. The Council agreed to supply sturdier and more expensive benches of a metal/concrete/wood construction, again, at our cost. We would like these to benefit those using the MUGA and be in keeping with other street furniture. So, we would like to know when and where this is going to be installed and the best place to site the benches. Also, if you have requirements for the type of benches we should look at. In addition to 3, we would like to provide a friendship; bench somewhere on the estate.

4. We understand that residents are paying (SJS/MVS?) a service charge for the Community Centre and there is growing frustration that they are not being allowed to use a facility they are paying for. Can they show us around the Centre, explain the management arrangements for booking and when it will be available. I did speak to Eilish about supporting an opening event, this is something we would still like to be involved with.

Also, with both our Beat Officer and Community Warden now operating in the area, they need their base available. (The Community Warden wants to start a Food Bank drop-off/pick up point)

5. We would like to understand firsthand the up-to-date position with regard to the building, opening of the Medical Centre and to confirm or scotch the alternative rumours.

6. Can you please advise us which Companies/Services are taking the 3 shops under the dentist surgery.

7. A second post box was agreed with the postal services on the completion of Worral Drive and Keepers Cottage Lane, and the surrounding developments in that area. Can you please advise us if you require the second post box. Also, we are currently producing our Highways Improvement Plan for KCC Highways and our Infrastructure Plan and would like input regarding any issues being experienced. So far, we have:

• A pelican crossing on Village Road near the Co-op to safeguard Children getting to school, particularly as this road is becoming busier and faster.

- Yellow lines around the school.
- Additional parking facility around the school (potentially using part of the field).
- Hump and speed signs along Village Road as at the end of July, there has been no response, but we shall continue to chase.

Potential Adult Education Courses Available Locally

We are working closely with TMBC to release some of the moneys due to the Parish under the S106 Agreements. So we are speaking to Adult

Education in order to facilitate different courses such as Family Learning,

Autism Awareness, Introduction to Seasonal Crafts i.e card making, floristry, decorations etc. and Managing Children's Behaviour. If you have any other ideas, please let us know.

Friendship Benches

Following a suggestion at the Annual Parish Meeting to have Friendship Benches around the Parish, Cllr Miles has led this project and has obtained



agreement from Orbit to provide one near their housing in Peters Village. This means that we can have more dotted around the Parish and are just waiting for approval from Trenport to install them. Other sites in Wouldham have not yet been identified, so if you have any ideas where they should go, please get in touch.

No-Entry Experiment - High Street

The KCC road change has now been in operation for some time. Whilst there are still some that think that the No Entry doesn't apply to them – it does!, the overall affect has been that traffic is generally flowing around the village better. Police letters have been sent to some offenders and there has been some enforcement. They continue to monitor the situation with regular patrols and discussions on a way forward. However, it has raised further infrastructure issues which would need to be looked at if the trial is adopted. i.e. better passing bays and reduced speed limits along Pilgrims Way, junction changes/ improvements at School Lane and the Knowle around the village and Residents still have time to get their comments to KCC via https:// letstalk.kent.gov.uk/high-street-wouldham. The deadline for submissions is 30th November, 2023.

Community Minibus

We have received a grant to provide a Community Minibus for Wouldham and Burham. This is a membership scheme open to all residents, which would be around £10/year, but will enable subsidised fares as bus and travel passes would not be applicable. This could be used for a 'shopper' service, group hire or day trips, so we need YOUR ideas Please email: clerk@wouldhampc.co.uk for further information

The Archaeology of Wouldham (Part 1 - Introduction)

Until relatively recently when I was asked what I do for a job I was usually faced with an unknowing grin, or a hesitant nod of the head when I said that I am an archaeologist. The puzzled expressions, however, soon changed into relief and acknowledgment when I mentioned two simple words: 'Time'and 'Team'. Over the past 30 years or so television programmes such as Time Team, Digging for Britain, and more recently The Great British Dig have undoubtedly introduced the archaeological world into people's homes, whether that be on the TV or via social media and video streaming applications. 'Ah Time Team' people now say, 'I know what that is; found any gold recently?' Well, the short answer to that is yes, but is it not at all common, and I certainly do not get to keep any of it.

So, what is archaeology? Firstly, I think it is important to note that we do not dig up dinosaurs, we leave that to our palaeontology friends. The technical, rather dry, definition is that 'archaeology is the study of human activity through the recovery and analysis of material culture', or the study of (ology) the ancient (archaeo). We investigate by carrying out excavations both large and small, where all archaeological finds and features (ditches, pits, postholes, etc.) are recorded, assessed, and then published so that we can gain insights into our past, our ancestors, and our landscapes which can be passed on for prosperity and future generations.

So why dig in the first place? That is a very good question. The easy answer is because these important sites are now under increasing threat due to development and construction. Thanks to changes in planning legislation over the last 30 years it has been possible to progress our knowledge of the Archaeological environment due to local developments which are subject to archaeological planning conditions. The 'polluter pays' principle mean that planning applications are now subject to environmental consideration, and archaeological remains form part of that environment.

As we are all very aware development in Kent and the Southeast has increased exponentially over the last few decades leading to many archaeological investigations being conducted; recording sites that would have otherwise been destroyed and forgotten. I remember as a young lad my father, who worked in construction all his life, told me stories of his time digging holes around Rochester finding underground tunnels and just filling them with concrete. Thankfully, those days are now well behind us as archaeologists are frequently involved in the construction process at a very early stage of the development. Never has this been truer than in and around our own villages. Many archaeological investigations have been carried out and are being carried out right on our doorstep and over the course of the next few months I would like to share the results from those excavations with the you, the reader. The archaeology of Wouldham and the surrounding landscape will start to emerge as, over the next few editions of the magazine, we explore recent archaeological remains associated with Peters Village, the new school, and Margetts Pit adding to the myriad of archaeological material already known on our doorsteps.

August-September in Your Garden



'I know that if odour were visible, as colour is, we would see the summer garden as rainbows.'

As summer wanes, the nights are drawing in and we enjoy our last bank holiday weekend before Christmas, it is the ideal opportunity to enjoy the garden in its summer splendour. The brightness of spring and early summer blooms now give way to the deep and sultry colours of late summer and autumn, with Dahlia, Achillea, Penstemon and Crocosmia all in full bloom. Roses too will be continuing to flower especially if you make dead-heading part of your weekly garden routine – most flowering plants will continue to produce new blooms if they are routinely dead-headed, so check over all displays to ensure you are getting the best from them.

We are all learning to accept that with the changing climate, we are needing to adapt the way in which we garden, by both finding ways to help our garden spaces survive both the droughts and the heat, but also at the same time trying to help the wildlife that rely so heavily on our green spaces. There are an increasing number of shrubs and perennials that are adapted to being able to cope with dry conditions, many of the grasses such as Miscanthus and Hakonechloa are well known, but there are also many flowering perennials such as Salvia, Lavender, Nepeta and Verbena as well as shrubs such as Abelia, Arbutus and Eleagnus that will all cope well with dry conditions. Good drainage is key for these plants, but it is also essential to ensure they are watered regularly whilst they get established, but once established they should be more than able to cope well with our increasingly dry summers.

Whilst things have had a slower start in the vegetable garden this year, by now most things will be into their main growth. Peas and beans will be producing pods, so be sure to harvest regularly to encourage more flowers and hence more pods, the same is true of courgettes so also harvest these young to encourage more fruit to set. Sweetcorn and squashes will now be swelling ready for harvest over the next few months too. By now Garlic should have been dug up and dried ready for storage, & onions will also be dying back ready for harvesting – once the leaves fall over & start to brown that's the time to lift them, and again dry them ensuring the skins are dried before storing them for use over the coming months. Tomatoes, Chillies and Peppers will also be setting their fruit and ripening, which all enjoy a sunny spot to help them ripen evenly and to keep flowering. Regular watering is key to successful tomatoes, however chillies prefer less water as that helps to increase their heat. Make sure to harvest tomatoes at peak ripeness and either use in salads and side dishes, or freeze for storage over winter – both tomatoes and chillies can be frozen raw so the harvest can be enjoyed well into winter. Regular feeding with a general purpose food will help to keep all veg crops in peak condition and help them to produce more flowers and subsequently more fruit, so include feeding in your routine with weeding



Other things to be doing in the garden now:

- Keep removing side shoots from tomatoes to direct energy to fruits
- Continue to harvest lettuces, radishes and other salads, and also soft fruits, blueberries, blackberries and currants.
- Sow additional quick crops such as carrots, peas, radish & lettuce to extend your growing season
- Be Water Wise. Lawns do not need watering in drought conditions, so focus watering to pots and any border plants that are wilting. Consider saving bath water to water the plants – the small amounts of detergents won't harm your plants and its more cost effective!
- Finish pruning cherry and plum trees before September.
- Feed & Weed treatments can be applied to lawns in the growing months, but check the weather before applying as they work best in warm weather when the ground is damp
- Consider the functional aspects of your garden is it adapted to enable you to ENJOY YOUR GARDEN whilst the summer lasts.
